Dr. Cohen has served as Dean of the Medical School, SUNY Stony Brook; Professor and Asso-

ciate Chair of Medicine, University of Chicago-Pritzker School of Medicine; and has held medical faculty appointments at Harvard, Brown and Tufts during his thirty years as a medical educator. He is a member of the National Academy of Science's Institute of Medicine.

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AMA Summit on Women in Medicine and Women's Health

The Second AMA Summit on Women in Medicine and Women's Health is being planned for the fall of 1995. I attended a recent planning meeting with representatives from the AMA, AMWA, the Federated Council in Internal Medicine and AMA student and resident representatives. The proposed meeting will continue to address the issues of the professional development and advancement of women physicians and improvement in health care for women.

All the attendees appreciated the differences in the cultures of the various subspecialty societies and the range of programs available. It was apparent that some women's subspecialty societies were much more successful than others. This was not related to the age of the organization but rather to the support by the parent society and secondly to the availability of funding for programs. Several societies received substantial support for educational programs from pharmaceutical companies. women's subspecialty society held a professional development workshop for interested members on a regular basis. In the worst case scenario the women described alienation from their parent professional society and a lack of access to leadership positions. There was unanimity that the networking and exchange of strategies and information was very helpful.

The upcoming meeting will emphasize areas omitted by other advocacy groups. There is the hope to develop a resource guide to help organizations build on the successful strategies of other women's subspecialty organizations. Subspecialty organizations like WIN will soon be requested to develop a report for this resource guide on our goals

and achievements. Eventually a report will be generated to be presented to the parent organization (e.g. ASN). The report can be used as a benchmark for the parent organization to assist their women colleagues. In addition, successful strategies in advancing women's health through research, patient care and education in gender differences will also be described in this report.

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Joint Symposium: Women in Nephrology and National Kidney Foundation

Women in Nephrology was again invited to cosponsor a symposium on Women's Health Issues during the Annual National Kidney Foundation meeting next November. The program was developed in consultation with the Women's Health Task Force and the Program Committee of the NKF.

The focus is, "Women's Health Issues Important for the Practicing Nephrologist." Our speakers will be:

- Dr. Cecil Coggins, Massachusetts General Hospital. His talk, entitled "Progression of Renal Disease in Women: Lessons from the MDRD Study," will bring us some new insights into the influence of gender on progression of renal disease. He has been one of a committee participating in a re-analysis to assess the effect of gender on the data accumulated during the MDRD study. Two years ago, as some of you will remember, Sharon Anderson addressed the topic of the effect of gender on progression of renal disease at the ASN meeting. Her summary of the available data, which at that time consisted largely of experimental studies in rats, suggested that female gender was an advantage and androgens a disadvantage. Now we'll learn whether this difference is being confirmed in humans.
- **Dr. Wendy Bloembergen**, University of Michigan. Her talk, entitled "Gender Differences in Treatment and Outcome of ESRD," will bring us a variety of insights into management of ESRD in women. The data come from the US Renal/Data Survey. Her data raise the important

question—are we doing everything possible to insure that there are no inequities in the access of women and minorities to all modalities of treatment for ESRD? Is there fairness in access to transplantation, or is it true, as some have suggested, that women give more and get less?

- **Dr. Vincent Armenti**, Jefferson Medical College. Dr. Armenti will bring us the latest insights into "Transplantation in Pregnancy." This is an area of good news. The registries maintained by Dr. Armenti are providing data that suggest pregnancy can be undertaken safely in selected transplant patients with relatively low risks for the graft and the mother, and with improving fetal outcome.
- Dr. Sharon Moe, University of Indiana. Dr. Moe, in her talk entitled "Renal Osteodystrophy: Do We Need a Different Approach in Women?", will address the difficult question of whether gender impacts on renal osteodystrophy and whether we need to develop different approaches to this common clinical problem in men and women.

We believe this will be a highly informative session and hope you will all try to attend.

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Report from the Women's Health Task Force of WIN

The Women's Health Task Force of WIN is entering into its second year. I was pleased to be asked by Ulla Kopp to chair the group this year. The Executive Council of WIN established this Task Force with the goals of increasing attention to health issues important to women with renal disease and of working to foster both research and educational activities in this area. The group represents individuals with interest in the area and expertise in an area of relevant applied research.

To date the principal activity of the Task Force has been to act as a resource and advocacy group for scientific programming for programs to both the National Kidney Foundation and the American Society of Nephrology Program Committees. The current membership is listed below. A meeting to

review priorities is planned at the time of next year's ASN meeting.

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National Kidney Foundation From: Dr. Wendy W. Brown St. Louis DVA Medical Center

In November I will begin a two year term as the first woman Chairman of the National Kidney Foundation. The NKF is a unique organization, founded 45 years ago by the parents of children with renal disease, that unites patient, professional and lay volunteers, both locally and nationally, to inform the public and health professionals, provide services to patients and raise money for research. The ultimate goal of the NKF is to take kidney disease from treatment to cure. Major initiatives include increased finding for research [in 1994, the NKF awarded 37 \$25,000 Fellowships, 17 \$25,000 Young Investigator grants, and the first Clinician Scientist Award (\$50,000/yr for 3 years)]; collaborative efforts with primary care physicians in early detection and prevention of renal disease; improved quality of care and rehabilitation for those who already have kidney or urinary tract disease; and public and professional education regarding organ donation. The work of the foundation is accomplished through 52 local affiliates and a small cadre of dedicated national staff and volunteers.

I encourage you as a member of WIN to become involved in these efforts at the local and/or national level. The Chair appoints members to national committees that include Annual Meeting, Fund Raising, Patient Services, Personnel, Public Policy, Training, Transplant Games, Planned Giving, Public Education, and Research Endowment. Committees with elected positions include Affiliate Relations, Finance and By-

Laws. There are also a number of Task Forces and other committees appointed each year. If you or someone you know is interested in being considered for appointment, I urge you obtain a nomination form from the National office (30 East 33rd St., NY, NY 10016). Appointments are made about the time of the Annual Meeting in November, but I encourage you to submit names as soon as possible.
